

Bettina Rheims

Bettina Rheims (French, b.1952) is a photographer best known for her erotic images of women. Born in Neuilly-sur-Seine, France, Rheims worked as a model before turning to photography in 1978. Her earliest series titled Portraits (1981) featured striptease artists and acrobats posing in her studio. In 1990, she photographed androgynous youths for her series Modern Lovers. She has collaborated with the novelist Serge Bramly on several projects, including the book Chambre Close, published in 1992, which accompanied the fictional narrative of "Monsieur X" with Rheims's photographs of women posing in hotel rooms.

Her series I.N.R.I. (1998), another collaboration with Bramly, is a biblical narrative illustrated by fashion models. Rheims has photographed fashion and celebrities for magazines and newspapers such as Elle, L'Officiel, and Marie Claire, and she has shot campaigns for Chanel and Lancôme, among other brands. In 1994, she was awarded the Grand Prix de la Photographie of the City of Paris. Her work has been exhibited at the Musée de l'Elysée in Lausanne, Switzerland, the Musée d'Art Moderne de la Ville de Paris, and the Städel Museum in Frankfurt, Germany. She currently lives and works in Paris.

Serge Bramly

Serge Bramly (born 31 January 1949 in Tunis, Tunisia) is a French–language writer and essayist. He was born into a Jewish family in Tunis, Tunisia. When he was ten years old, his family emigrated to France. He was married to photographer Bettina Rheims, with whom he has collaborated frequently, and had a son, Virgile. His novel La terreur dans le boudoir was adapted by Benoît Jacquot for the 2000 French film Sade. He is also noted for his books on Leonardo da Vinci and the Mona Lisa–Leonardo: Discovering the Life of Leonardo da Vinci,1991 Leonar– do: The Artist and the Man (1995), and Mona Lisa: The Enigma (2005). In 2008 he won the prix Interallié for his novel Le Premier Principe – Le Second Principe.
